Help Wanted for the Leelanau Harvest Tour

Participating in his first year as Director of the Leelanau Harvest Tour, Dan Witt-kopp is looking for all the help he can get to make this major event a success.

"Although the Leelanau Harvest Tour does not normally have as many riders as Ride Around Torch, it requires about the same number of volunteers," Wittkopp says.

Wittkopp is currently filling out the roster of volunteers and still needs help in the

areas of food stops, registration, SAG drivers, t-shirt distribution, event-day tasks and servers for lunch.

Last year, about 450 cyclists rolled into Fall with the LHT. Wittkopp's goal is to boost participation to 500 riders, with the added allure of a post-ride dinner catered by Sparks BBQ. It's a "last chance" to get in a major cycle tour to wind up the season and Wittkopp is urging club members who aren't volunteering to give it a spin.

Ride leader Tami Stagman has some cautionary advice for cyclists who want to join her Leelanau Hills ride on Tuesday evenings: "It's not a beginner ride, it's for seasoned riders who like a hill challenge," she says. "If you're not used to riding hills, it can be pretty difficult!" She

Actually, "ride leader" is a bit of a misnomer, since Tami tends to ride the sweep position with ther group, making sure that no one gets left behind on the up-and-down circuit of some of Leelanau County's steepest hills. She launched the ride last summer, with participants meeting at the Subway lot off M-22 at 6 p.m. on Tuesdays. The ride attracts anywhere from 9-17 cyclists.

"We ride a different route each week, picking different hills to ride," she says. "It ends up being about 1,200 feet of climbing on a ride of 28 to 32 miles"

A Certified Medical Assistant with the practice of internist Steven Lamie, M.D., Stagman is a notable endurance athlete who most recently placed fourth in the Interlochen Sprint Triathlon.

When she's not leading the Leelanau Hills ride, chances are you'll find Tami Stagman training to hike the John Muir Trail in California this August. Above, riders on a recent cruise to Cedar and back.

But her biggest challenge lies ahead: this August, she's heading to California with fellow club-members Nancy Briggs and Gussie Peterson to hike up to 140 miles of the mountainous John Muir Trail, said to be the most beautiful stretch of the Pacific Coast Trail. That has meant a heavy schedule of training hikes for her this summer, carrying a 35-pound pack on long stretches of the North Country Trail route through Michigan.

One thing for sure, after biking all of those hills in Leelanau County, Tami is sure to have the leg strength needed for a long hike through the Sierra Nevadas!

The Leelanau Hills ride meets every Tuesday, 6 p.m., at the parking lot behind Subway Sandwich near Grandview Parkway off M-22. The next ride will be to Maple City.

A DANGEROUS STRETCH of M-22 between Bohemian Road and Leland is a lot safer this summer, thanks to the road-widening efforts of the Michigan Department of Transportation.

As of last week, improvements were still underway on M-22, including striping to create a shoulder lane that's safe for cycling. It's a vast improvement over the crumbling, non-existent shoulder of M-22, which has been deteriorating for years. Bonus: it should make riding in this fall's Leelanau Harvest Tour much safer.
